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Prophecy & Advent

BERCEUSE, a lullaby from *Petite Suite poure Noël*, composed by Jean-Michel Vaccaro (1938-98), opens our program. A deeply introspective work, the interplay of the cello and piano conveys the sense of heartfelt longing characterized by the Advent season. Markus Compton is the arranger.



KEEP YOUR LAMPS! is a traditional spiritual based on Matthew 25:1–13, Jesus's parable of ten virgins who went with lamps to meet the bridegroom. Five did not bring enough oil for the vigil and left to get more. Only the five who had prepared well were present to escort the bridegroom into the wedding banquet. Jesus's message to us from Matthew 25:13 (NIV): "Therefore keep watch, because you do not know the day or the hour" that the prophecy will be fulfilled. Says arranger André J. Thomas (b. 1952), "One can only imagine the song stirring from the soul of one slave listener. Jesus was indeed a deliverer and a hope for the slave."

Keep your lamps trimmed and burning, the time is drawing nigh.
Children, don't get weary 'til your work is done.
Christian, journey soon be over, the time is drawing nigh.



Elaine Hagenberg (b. 1979) has rapidly become a favorite composer among RCS concertgoers, as represented by the rapturous reaction to our 2024 and 2025 presentations of her five-movement work *Illuminare*. Today we present two shorter Hagenberg pieces. The first, a captivating arrangement of **My Song in the Night**, highlights the elegant sensitivity of this traditional American folk hymn. As the tender melody gently drifts through each vocal part, a newly-composed refrain gracefully soars over a lush piano accompaniment. Finally, a shimmering tapestry of descending lines gently brings the piece to a restful conclusion. (Source: elainehagenberg.com)

The setting of **Honor and Glory** is comprised from the fugue section of BWV 243 (Magnificat) by Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750), Mary's timeless song of praise to God. The Latin words of the composition were initially derived from Luke 1:55. Walter Ehret (1918-2009), who enjoyed a long career as an arranger of choral music during the mid-twentieth century, significantly changed the text to a universal song of praise to God.

Honor and glory be to God in the highest, Hallelujah. Sing praises to his name!

Program Notes and Text

Like so many traditional carols, the origins of **THE FIRST NOWELL** are steeped in mystery. Scholars believe it to be from the 16th or 17th century, but possibly it dates from as early as the 13th century. This combination of tune and lyrics first appeared in the early 1800s. (Source: hymnsandcarolsof christmas.com). There are at least nine known verses for the tune; we are presenting three today. If you wish, please join us in song!

At the Stable

Renowned composer and educator André J. Thomas is the retired Owen F. Sellers Professor of Music, Director of Choral Activities, and Professor of Choral Music Education at Florida State University. In March of 2017 the American Choral Directors Association presented Thomas with its highest honor, The Robert Shaw Award, and in November of 2017 the National Collegiate Choral Organization presented Thomas with its Lifetime Achievement Award. In January 2019 he was inducted into the Florida Music Educator's Hall of Fame. (Source: drandrethomas.com) Written for the world-renowned St. Olaf Choir, Dr. Thomas used a Liberian chant tune as the basis of **AFRICAN NOEL.**

Program Notes and Text

Legendary film composer John Williams (b. 1932) by chance attended a screening of the 1990 film *Home Alone* that director Chris Columbus had provided to associates of Steven Spielberg. Williams' enthusiasm for the film caused him to actively seek the assignment of composing the score after the production's original composer had to bow out due to a scheduling conflict. It had been a while since Williams had composed a score specifically aimed at children, and after raving about the initial cut of the film to his own circle of colleagues, he tackled the new genre with so much zeal that the resulting fruitful friendship with Columbus would lead to several subsequent endeavors in that genre (including the Harry Potter films). Not only were the ramifications exciting for Williams' fans, but the composer approached the project with a refreshing new enthusiasm that carried over into the tone of his composition, providing what essentially amounts to the perfect comedic Christmas score. Williams composed this part of the *Home Alone* score in a minor key which, along with the heartfelt lyrics of **STAR OF BETHLEHEM** by Leslie Bricusse (1931-2021), lends a deep poignancy to this song.

Morten Lauridsen (b. 1943) is perhaps the best-known contemporary choral composer, with his works in perpetual performance around the world. He served as Composer-in-Residence of the Los Angeles Master Chorale from 1995-2001 and is currently the Distinguished Professor Emeritus of Composition at the University of Southern California Thornton School of Music. An award-winning documentary by Michael Stillwater, *Shining Night – A Portrait of Composer Morten Lauridsen*, was released in 2012 (Source: songwithoutborders.net). In 2006, Lauridsen was named an "American Choral Master" by the National Endowment for the Arts. In 2007 he was awarded the National Medal of Arts, the highest artistic award in the United States, by President George W. Bush in a White House ceremony "for his composition of radiant choral works combining musical beauty, power, and spiritual depth." Composer Elaine Hagenberg describes her setting of **ALLELUIA**, from the beautiful text by St. Augustine of Hippo (354-430):

One evening in summer, I gathered this poem and a manuscript notebook, then visited our local rose gardens at dusk to sketch all the ways I could sing the word "Alleluia." A simple A B A form seemed to work, with the Alleluias creating the A sections, and the remaining text to create a contrasting B section. As the sunset filtered through the trees, I envisioned the light and beauty of eternity with expansive lines and lush harmonies propelling the music into exciting key changes and a climactic ending. Originally published in the 1551 edition of French Protestant pastor and reformer John Calvin's *Genevan Psalter*, the words to **COMFORT, COMFORT NOW MY PEOPLE** is a versification of Isaiah 40:1-5, the passage that opens the final large group of prophecies in Isaiah 40-66. Many of these prophecies express consolation and hope that Judah's exile in Babylon is almost over. (Source: hymnary.org) The tune *Freu dich sehr* is attributed to 16th century French composers Louis Bourgeois and Claude Goudimel. Church organist and composer Aaron Shows gives a modern-day spriteliness to this delightful arrangement.

Our next offering is a dynamic, modern take on two old favorites, **CAROL OF THE BELLS/GOD REST YE**MERRY GENTLEMEN by Matthew Riley (b. 1982), presented by pianist Keith Tan and violinist Luz

We have our own parlor game set up for you, our audience: See if you can place the correct composer or style to the correct day! The answers appear at the end of the notes*. The Richmond Choral Society's 2019 Christmas concert featured an original arrangement for solo piano by Keith Tan, a combination of the timeless traditional carol **JOY TO THE WORLD** with the exuberant Irish folk tune of celebration **TOSS THE FEATHERS** in a delightful interplay of themes. This year, Keith is letting the choristers in on the fun! This joyful reel dances and spins with driving rhythms, melding two pieces of celebration in a playful yet natural and seamless whole. As this Irish folk tune is in Dorian scale, the chord structures and progressions of the carol have been altered to suit the character of this Celtic reel.

Felix Mendelssohn (1809-47) wrote a cantata in 1840 to commemorate Johann Gutenberg and the invention of printing. The words to **HARK! THE HERALD ANGELS SING** were written more than a century before by Methodist leader and prolific hymnodist Charles Wesley (1707-88). After Mendelssohn and Wesley were both dead, English tenor and organist William Cummings put the words and music together, even though Mendelssohn had made it clear his music was for secular use, and Wesley preferred slow, solemn music for his lyrics. Nevertheless, the carol has become so revered that it has the distinction of being one of only two carols that are played each year during the Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols at King's College, Cambridge. Markus J. Compton • Conductor



Markus J. Compton has been associated with the Richmond Choral Society since 2004. This is his seventeenth season as Artistic Director after serving as rehearsal accompanist for the previous five years.

Holding degrees in Music Education and Piano Accompanying from George Mason University, Mr. Compton is no stranger to the music scene in metropolitan Washington, D.C. and Richmond. Before beginning his tenure with the Richmond Choral Society, Mr. Compton served as the Assistant Conductor and Pianist for the Fairfax Choral Society and Pianist for the National Men's Chorus. He also worked as staff accompanist, vocal coach and lecturer at

George Mason University. Mr. Compton has assisted such distinguished conductors as Anton Armstrong, Thomas Beveridge, Jerry Blackstone, Kevin Fenton, Joseph Martin, Don Neuen, Doreen Rao and Andre Thomas. He has performed at the National Gallery of Art, the White House and in a collaborative recital with Peter Schikele (PDQ Bach).

Currently, Mr. Compton is the Director of Music and Pianist at Hebron Presbyterian Church, in Manakin-Sabot, Virginia. He oversees the Sanctuary and Youth choirs, as well as the 'Music in the Countryside' recital series. Mr. Compton also serves on the staff at Collegiate School where he teaches private piano.

Christopher Martin · Organ

A native of Richmond, Va., Christopher Martin has been the Director of Music and Organist at Grace Covenant Presbyterian Church in Richmond since May 2000. As Director of Music he leads the church's music ministry which includes three singing choirs, a handbell choir, and an annual concert series. As a certified MusikGarten instructor, he teaches music to over forty children in the church's Child Development Center.

Christopher holds a Master of Sacred Music degree in organ performance from Boston



University where he studied organ and improvisation with Max Miller. He also holds a Bachelor of Music degree (*magna cum laude*) from Virginia Commonwealth University where he studied with Ardyth Lohuis.

Christopher has been a recitalist for numerous venues throughout the East Coast. In 2015 he was a featured artist in San Sebastián, Spain, and in 2022 he performed in a recital in the Bordeaux region of France. His solo performances have also been featured on the radio broadcast, Pipedreams.

He is in demand as an organist for numerous choral ensembles throughout the Richmond area, including the Richmond Choral Society where he has served as organist since 2002. In 2014, he was the organist in residence for one week at Canterbury Cathedral (Kent), playing Evensong services and the Sunday Choral Eucharist with the choir from River Road Church, Baptist (Richmond).

Keith T. Tan • Concert and Rehearsal Accompanist (piano)

Keith is a dedicated accompanist, music minister, and educator based in Richmond, Virginia. He has been an accompanist for the Richmond Choral Society since 2009, the James River Singers since 2011, and the Richmond Ballet since 2016, showcasing his exceptional piano skills and collaborative spirit in various musical arenas.

Keith teaches private piano at The Center of Creative Arts and has provided instruction at the University of Richmond from 1998 to 2007. In addition, he has served as a vocal coach since 2010, helping singers develop their talents. Serving as an adjudicator for the Virginia Music Education Association, Keith has participated in choral assessments and auditions, demonstrating his commitment to music education.

With over two decades of music ministry experience, Keith has made a significant impact on the musical community at Christ



Church Episcopal, where he has nurtured a thriving music and arts program, producing seven music albums. His contributions to contemporary and traditional church music have been recognized in publications, including his essay in Ponder Anew (2022), and he was a panelist at the Virginia Theological Seminary symposium, "The Once and Future Hymnal," in 2017.

As a composer and arranger, Keith's works have been performed by the Richmond Choral Society, the James River Singers, and the Richmond Symphony. His piece "Sanctus" was commissioned by the Association of Anglican Musicians for their 2020 Annual Conference, reflecting his dedication to nurturing the intersection of worship and the arts.

Keith is married to Lara and they have three children - Rachel, Jordan, and Caedmon.

A Brief History

Seventy-nine years ago, one hundred of Richmond's best singers gathered on Monday nights to rehearse selections from a spectrum of musical sources—the classical masters, hymns, spirituals, folk arrangements, novelty songs and contemporary works. On April 29, 1947, the singers, soon to be known as the Richmond Choral Society, premiered those nineteen pieces in a concert at the WRVA Theater on East Broad Street.

After launching the group to accolades from music critics, Dr. James Rawlings Sydnor passed the baton in 1949 to Alton L. Howell Sr., who served as director until his death in 1987. Anne Carr Regan then took over. Under the leadership of both, the Richmond Choral Society continued to develop, performing (alone and with other groups) many of the great choral works. Mrs. Regan expanded the group's repertoire to include theater and popular music.

Under the direction of Thomas A. Williams from 2002-2009, the Richmond Choral Society (RCS) continued to chart new territory. In 2004, RCS presented a landmark performance of Ernest Bloch's *Avodath Hakodesh* (Sacred Service), in collaboration with Congregation Beth Ahabah. The *Richmond Times-Dispatch*'s Clarke Bustard wrote of the Bloch concert, "Thank goodness community groups like the Richmond Choral Society are willing to take on repertory that professional ensembles lack the initiative or imagination to perform."

The Richmond Choral Society's current artistic director, Markus Compton, continues the tradition of excellence in performance and programming that makes us unique in the Central Virginia area. In April 2011, RCS proudly presented the Richmond premiere of *Yizkor Requiem*, featuring world-renowned cantor Benjamin Warschawski. March 2013 saw the production of the Dvořák *Stabat Mater*, a rarely-performed but beautiful concert-length masterwork.
